	<p>I'm curious to learn how your jurisdiction generates correspondence for rejected documents? Does your business entity system generate the correspondence automatically or do you use another product?</p> <p>Correspondence, in this context, could be paper or email.</p>

Corporations Canada	<p>At Corporations Canada our correspondence for rejected applications is generated automatically by our system software, using a set of "deficiency codes", which are selected by an individual examiner. These codes relate to common reasons of rejection, so our examiners simply choose the appropriate code, and the system sends a "notice of deficiency" that explains the reason for rejection, and also explains how to resubmit. These "deficiency codes" all contain pre-defined text, so that examiners do not have to type up an explanation of the rejection.</p> <p>In addition to the pre-set codes, our examiners are also able to manually create text to be included in the notice of deficiency. This is used to add clarifying information to the notice, or for unusual cases for which no pre-set code exists. This allows us the ability to send out quick automated notices, as well as more personalized/specific notices, if the situation dictates.</p> <p>For online/email filings, these notices of deficiency are returned by email to the address on file; for paper submissions, the notice is sent by mail to the registered office address.</p>
